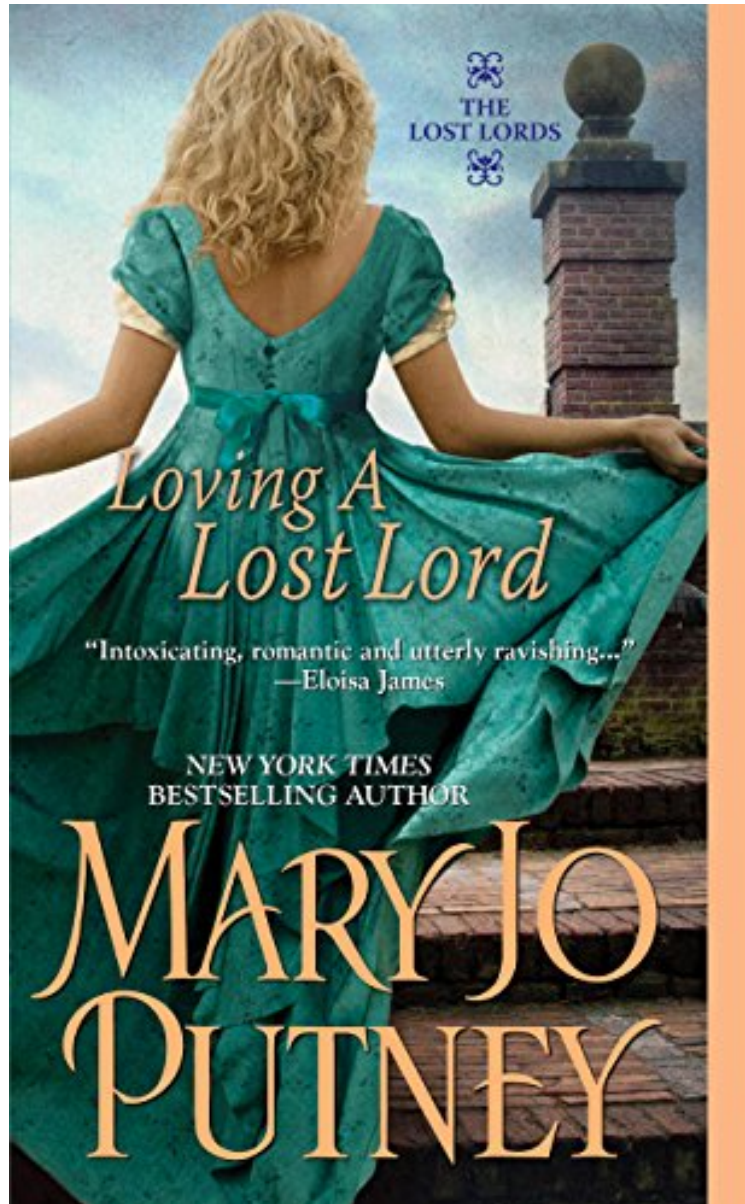

Lord No. 1----Von Steffi A. "Loving a lost Lord" is Putney's first book in her new series called "The lost Lords" - six childhood friends who have one thing in common: a flair for defying convention. They were all very difficult children and thus ended up in Lady Agnes Westerfield's school for lost Lords. Growing up together, the six boys soon became fast friends and a bond was formed between them that lasts until today - they are like brothers who would do everything for each other....Lost Lord No. 1 - and therefore our new hero - is called Adam Darshan Lawford, Duke of Ashton. The only problem is, that he doesn't quite remember who and what he is.....\*\*\*Ever since her Grandmother's death, Mariah Clarke is touring England with her father who is earning his money with his skill at cards. Though she loves him very much she never really enjoyed life on the road and so Mariah is more than happy when her father wins Hartley Manor in Cumberland at a card game. Soon after they settled down however, her father has to leave in order to take care of some family business - and he never returns. Instead George Burke, the former owner of Hartley Manor arrives and tells Mariah that her father was killed by highwaymen. Burke also proposes marriage to her, seeing it as a chance to get his home back. Mariah, in her desperation to get rid of him, tells him that she already has a husband but still he wouldn't leave her alone. When one night she discovers a body washed ashore Mariah can not believe her good fortune. She rescues the man and nurses him back to health. Soon she has to learn that the handsome stranger doesn't remember who he is and Mariah ends up telling him that he is her husband, Adam Clarke. (The name "Adam" she picked at random - haha :-)) Not remembering anything or anyone scares the hell out of Adam and so he gladly accepts everything Mariah is telling him. She is beautiful and caring and so it's not hard to believe that he had married her and as time passes and his memory still fails him he is more and more glad to have her at his side. So naturally, when Mariah finally tells him that she had been lying and that they are not married at all, Adam feels lost once again. He doesn't know how or what to feel for her anymore but when his friends (who had been looking for him these past weeks) finally find him and want to take him back to London Adam doesn't want to leave without Mariah. He is holding on to their "betrothal" not yet knowing if they are really going to marry but also not yet ready to let her go. In London, Mariah is watching how Adam settles back into his real life as a duke and the hope for a future with him vanishes more and more. She knows that a duke does not marry someone like her. But just when Adam is sure that he loves Mariah and wants to marry her for good his aunt tells him that he is already betrothed to his cousin Janey - OH OH!!\*\*\*Once again Putney invented a remarkable, interesting story that could have been a really great love story with heartache, longing and yearning and finally a nice happy end. I wrote "could have" because it was not really what I was hoping for. Especially in the second part of the book Putney got a little bit carried away and she lost focus of the "Love-story-part". So many things happen at the end that it was kind of overwhelming. Ridiculously a whole BUNCH of people who are presumed dead are not dead at all....Well, "Loving a lost Lord" is a typical 3-stars book, meaning that it was a nice, easy read that kept me entertained for as long as I was reading it.
