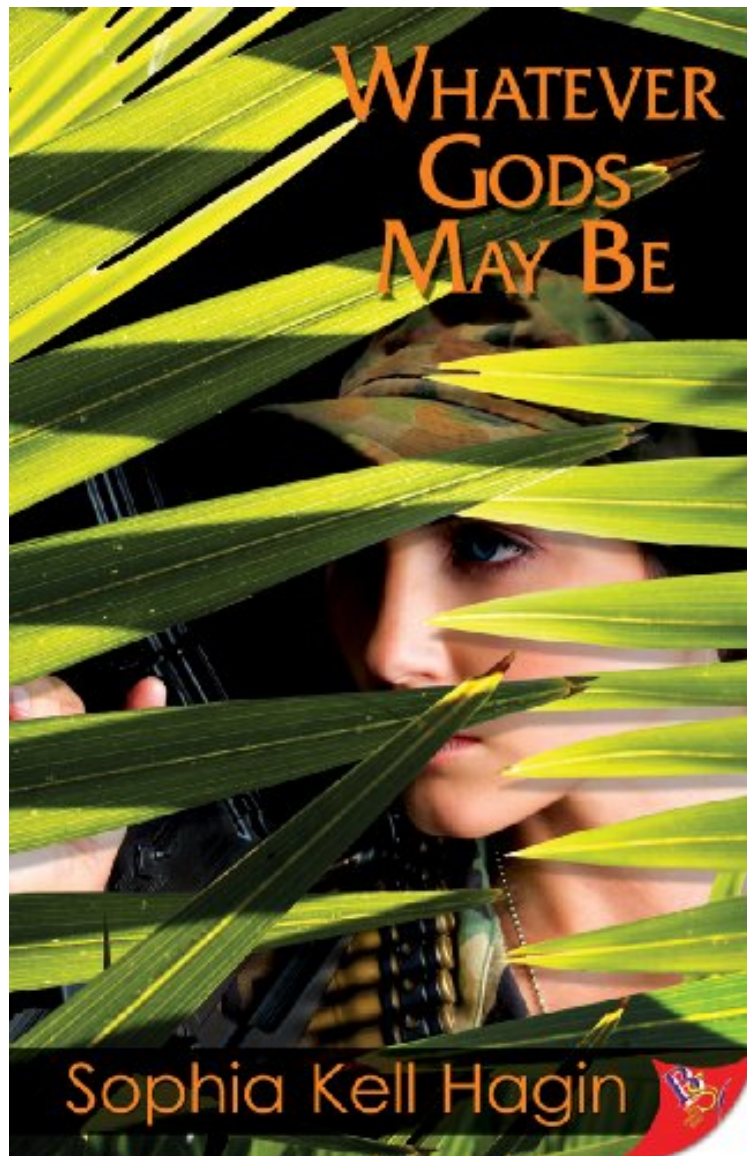

love. _____ My review: This one was tough to get into because of all the military jargon. But the story is worth the perseverance needed to finish it. Though beware: This is neither a light read nor a romance. Not at all. The cruelty of war is portrayed rather explicitly. There are even some torture scenes. Still, Jamie Gwynmorgan's story kept me captivated. Enlisting in the army with age 17 she soon finds herself in the middle of a war and faces death nearly every day. The author does a good job portraying her. This is a book for those looking for a captivating read which isn't a romance. Her language is powerful, compelling and intense. The story and the language reflect and complement in many ways the setting of this book: The jungle. The jungle, the life of Jamie, the wording, the story itself are lethal, beautiful, fierce, complex, diverse, poisonous, teeming with life, innocent, awesome ... and add up to a very potent concoction. It left me breathless, speechless at the end in its intensity -- and stayed with me for several days sinking in all crevices of my mind. It is certainly not an easy read (let alone a romance), but it is rich, even opulent and rewarding. It reminded me of movies who tried to come to terms with the reality of the Vietnam war with the added ingredient of a female warrior archetype.
